Dear Friends,

There have been times in each of our lives when we have needed a helping hand..... when “someone” reached out and shared their time, talents, or treasure to help us through a rough spot. Your generosity allows Freehold Area Open Door to “Be the One,” the one who provides that support, who helps our neighbors deal with food insecurity, finds support services, enrolls in an after-school program, helps

pay for utilities to prevent homelessness, even at times provides small scholarships for higher education.

Each month we support over 3,500 of our neighbors with the basic necessities of life. Whether they need a three-day supply of food, a week’s supply of food or even a month’s supply of food our “doors are open” to them. If they need a free after-school program to support their children, help finding social services, or help with the rent our “doors are open.”

Our community partners and your generous donations make this possible. Our mission partners provide donations that allow us to purchase things like milk, eggs, diapers, wipes, and toilet paper, so our neighbors don’t go without.

On any given day you will see our dedicated volunteers, who do everything from our drivers who pick up donations and deliver them to Open Door; our volunteers who sort donations and pack boxes of food; our front of the house volunteers who greet our clients, create a welcoming environment and help them navigate the daily food offerings. They all give of both their time and talents to support our community.

We are proud to have you as part of our community, and your support inspires us to continue our work and mission. Please know that your generosity is not only deeply appreciated but also makes an invaluable difference. FOOD PANTRY OUR REMARKABLE IMPACT

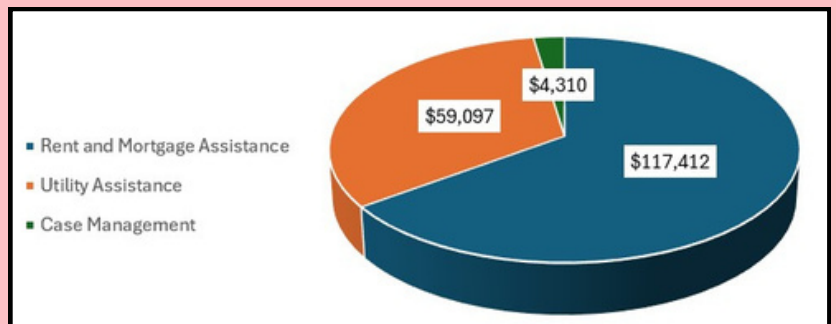


ADVOCACY: EMPOWERING STABILITY



In 2024, our Advocacy program provided a lifeline to hundreds of families and individuals, distributing over \$180,000 in assistance to 269 households. This effort was not just about numbers—it was about stability, hope, and rebuilding lives. Our Advocacy program focuses on three main areas, rental assistance, utility assistance and case management.

From food and toiletries to household necessities, our team delivered these critical supplies regularly, often becoming the only point of contact for some clients throughout the month.

These efforts go beyond logistics—they are lifelines. Each delivery is a testament to our commitment to holistic care, addressing not only physical needs but also alleviating isolation and enhancing quality of life. Through partnerships with Fulfill, our retail donors, community organizations, and dedicated volunteers, our social workers provided unwavering, compassionate support to those who needed it most.

This work is a reflection of our mission in action: meeting people where they are and ensuring that no one is ever left behind.

HOPE THROUGH HARDSHIP

AMBER'S STORY

Freehold Area Open Door not only gives out food to those in need, but we give people a sense of hope and dignity. We'd like to tell you the story of Amber.

One morning, Amber walked into our pantry, her shoulders heavy with the weight of the world. She came seeking food, but as we handed her the items, she hesitated for a moment before quietly asking to speak to someone on the staff.

In a soft, wavering voice, Amber shared her story. She is a single grandmother, living in a small, impersonal motel room—her only refuge after losing her home.

Life had turned upside down when her daughter was recently detained, leaving Amber to care for her young granddaughter. Despite the sudden responsibility, she was determined to make her granddaughter feel safe and loved, even in such difficult circumstances.

Then, almost timidly, Amber asked if there was any chance we could help with more than food — perhaps some sheets, towels, or even something she could use to cook meals. Her request was a reminder of the sheer resilience it takes to keep going when every day feels like an uphill climb.

Thanks to the generosity of our amazing partners, Amazon and Target, we sometimes receive non-food donations. This time, we were able to provide Amber with a double-burner hot plate and a new set of sheets. As we handed her these items, her eyes filled with tears, and her voice broke as she said, "Thank you for listening and helping me."

Her gratitude was palpable, and in that moment, we were reminded of the profound impact even small acts of kindness can have. It's not just about meeting basic needs—it's about giving people like Amber a renewed sense of hope, dignity, and a reason to keep moving forward.

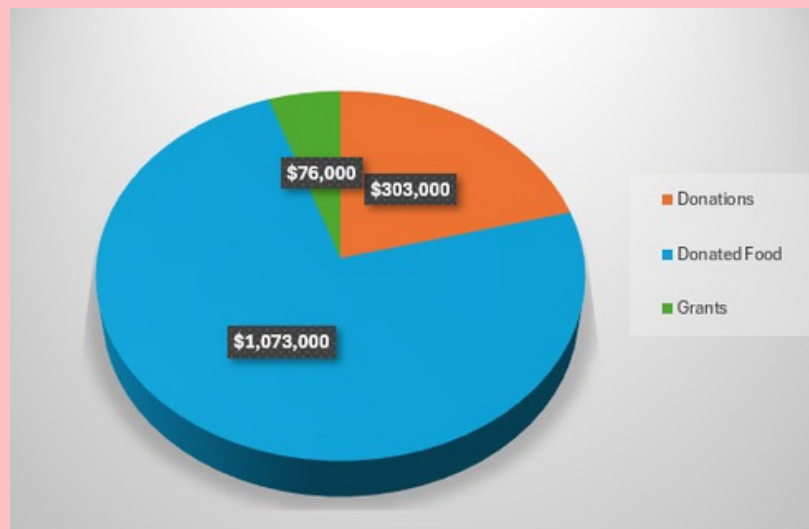

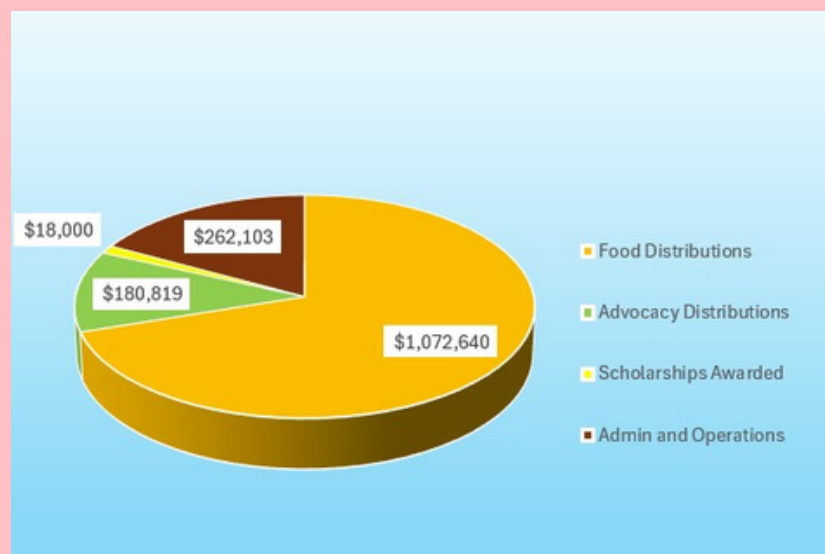

From the beginning, it's been our mission to solve food insecurity in the local Freehold area. When we set out on this journey over 35 years ago, we were a grass roots group, serving about 1,000 people in 1987. In 2024 we served over 40,000 people.

Since 1987, Freehold Area Open Door has assisted over **350,000** people. Although it's a massive achievement, it's too small a dent in the ongoing food insecurity crisis. There is a clear need to continue the hard work of executing our programs of collaborating with local partners to providing food and housing assistance for everyone in the community – and to do so at a faster and more efficient pace.

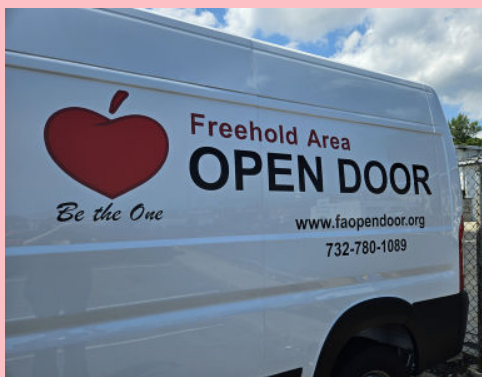
Please join us as we continue our mission to help feed the hungry, to keep people in their homes, and to help them navigate the social services system. Many of our clients and neighbors are facing rising food prices, rising rent and utilities and we don't always have enough to meet their needs. In the last four years many of our former donors have become clients. We humbly ask for your help and support however you can.

- \$25 provides a week of meals for a family of 4.
- \$25 helps cover utility bills for a struggling household.
- \$50 ensures fresh produce and staples for two families.
- \$50 contributes toward emergency rent or mortgage payments.
- \$100 sustains four families for an entire week.
- \$100 provides critical assistance to keep a family of 4 safe in their home.

Whatever you can donate, your donation helps keep our “**doors open**” and allows us to “**Be the One**” who on your behalf reaches out to help our neighbors and our community.
